lines by John Seed). The boys were really excited, and we later drew maps of the galaxy based on the figures in the song. They talked about it and said to me, "You know the game Trivial Pursuits?"

"Yes."

"Well, what's the opposite of trivial? Couldn't we make a game like Profound Pursuits, which taught you information like this song does?"

With that memory in mind, my thoughts for the Epic of Evolution community are two-fold: First, if a picture is worth a thousand words, the right song can be worth a thousand pictures. Second, as important as I thought learning this song was for the boys, far more important was their decision to join me at the action, which protected the tropical rainforests of Australia. Ed Abbey once wrote, "Sentiment without action is the ruination of the soul," which I would here paraphrase as "deep time without deep ecology remains a trivial pursuit."
